Executive summary

This is the report on our 2023 Review of UK Parliament Constituencies, conducted between 2021 and 2023. The review has been carried out under the Parliamentary Constituencies Act 1986, most recently amended by the Parliamentary Constituencies Act 2020.

The legislation for this review means that there will be 57 constituencies in Scotland in place of the current 59. This reflects changes in the electorate across the whole of the UK. The overall number of UK Parliament MPs remains at 650. Two of the constituencies are specified in the legislation as Orkney and Shetland constituency and Na h-Eileanan an lar constituency (the Western Isles). We are recommending the boundaries for the remaining 55 constituencies, which cover Scotland's 29 mainland council areas. Where we refer to mainland council areas or mainland constituencies we mean all those other than the protected constituencies.

Each constituency must have an area of no more than 13,000 square kilometres. Each constituency must have an electorate within 5% of the average for a UK mainland constituency, 73,393: for this review this means an electorate no fewer than 69,724 and no more than 77,062.

There are two exemptions that allow a constituency to have an electorate of fewer than 69,724:

- it is either the Na h-Eileanan an Iar constituency or the Orkney and Shetland constituency; or
- its area exceeds 12,000 square kilometres and we are satisfied that it is not reasonably possible for it to have an electorate of at least 69,724.

None of our recommended constituencies exceeds 12,000 square kilometres.

Our recommendations include eight mainland constituencies unchanged from existing constituencies: Ayr, Carrick and Cumnock; Berwickshire, Roxburgh and Selkirk; Central Ayrshire; East Renfrewshire; Kilmarnock and Loudoun; Midlothian; North Ayrshire and Arran; and West Aberdeenshire and Kincardine constituencies.

The new requirements have resulted in 18 constituencies crossing council boundaries. Of the recommended mainland constituencies, 37 are contained within a single council area compared with 48 of the existing mainland constituencies.

Our recommended constituencies are summarised in Chapter 5. Maps of each constituency appear in Appendix G.





1 Introduction

Boundary Commission for Scotland

- 1.1 We are responsible for keeping UK Parliament constituencies in Scotland under review and making recommendations to Ministers, as required by the Parliamentary Constituencies Act 1986. We conduct our reviews independently of political considerations or influence and according to the rules established in the legislation.
- 1.2 There is more information about our work on our website www.bcomm-scotland. independent.gov.uk.
- 1.3 Our membership during this review is listed at the beginning of this report.

This report

- 1.4 This report presents our Final Recommendations from our 2023 Review of UK Parliament Constituencies.
- 1.5 The legislation requires us to submit this report before 1 July 2023.
- 1.6 The legislation for this review means that there will be 57 constituencies in Scotland instead of the current 59. Two of the constituencies are specified in the legislation as Orkney and Shetland constituency and Na h-Eileanan an Iar constituency (the Western Isles). We are recommending the remaining 55 constituencies which cover Scotland's 29 mainland council areas. Where we refer to mainland council areas or mainland constituencies we mean all those other than the protected constituencies.
- 1.7 Our recommended constituencies are summarised in Chapter 5. Maps of each constituency appear in Appendix G.
- 1.8 In this report, we refer to documents which we have published on our website. Paper copies are available on request.

2 This review

Timing

- 2.1 On 5 January 2021, the review was announced simultaneously in each of the four constituent parts of the United Kingdom by the respective Boundary Commissions.
- 2.2 Each Commission is required to submit its report before 1 July 2023. The four Commissions liaised with each other on progress during the review. Decisions about the review in Scotland, however, are our responsibility alone.
- 2.3 The period required to undertake the review is dictated by the size of the task, our procedures and the legislation. Our procedures are intended to allow public engagement and full expression of opinions about the proposals at each stage.

Legislation

- 2.4 The legislation governing this review is the Parliamentary Constituencies Act 1986, most recently amended by the Parliamentary Constituencies Act 2020. The full text of the 1986 Act as it applies to this review is published at www.legislation.gov.uk/ukpga/1986/56/contents.
- 2.5 The 2020 Act substantially amended the 1986 Act. As a result, this review was conducted within a different legislative framework from the review that determined the existing constituency boundaries. This included the length of our consultation stages and timing of our future reviews.
- 2.6 The legislation specifies that there are to be 650 constituencies in total, with each constituency returning a single member to the United Kingdom Parliament.
- 2.7 The legislation specifies two Scottish island constituencies:
 - a constituency covering the combined extent of Orkney Islands Council area and Shetland Islands Council area; and
 - a constituency covering Na h-Eileanan an Iar Council area.
- 2.8 In England and Wales, the legislation specifies that the Isle of Wight will have two constituencies and Ynys Môn (Anglesey) one constituency.
- 2.9 No constituency is permitted to be larger than 13,000 square kilometres.
- 2.10 The United Kingdom electoral quota, 73,393, is the total electorate for the United Kingdom excluding the five island constituencies, divided by 645, which is the number of constituencies outside those areas. In simple terms, the United Kingdom electoral quota is the average electorate per mainland constituency across the United Kingdom.
- 2.11 Every constituency must have an electorate that is no less than 95% and no more than 105% of the United Kingdom electoral quota, with specified exceptions:
 - the island constituencies listed above; and
 - any constituency larger than 12,000 square kilometres which may in specific circumstances have an electorate smaller than the usual minimum limit.
- 2.12 The legislation states that we may take into account, as we think fit, other factors, namely:
 - special geographical considerations, including in particular the size, shape and accessibility of a constituency;

- boundaries of council areas and electoral wards (we took account of the ward boundaries in place at the start of the review from 2017);
- existing constituency boundaries; and
- any local ties which would be broken by changes in constituencies.
- 2.13 How we took these factors into account is described in Chapter 3.

Electorate

- 2.14 The legislation specifies that this review use the electoral register from 2 March 2020. The legislation makes no provision for us to take account of any changes in the electorate after 2 March 2020.
- 2.15 The definition of electorate is the total number of people whose names appear on the register of parliamentary electors. This definition includes "attainers", who are those individuals on the register who became of voting age after 1 March 2020 and before 2 March 2021. For this review, the electorate data for each part of the United Kingdom is shown in Table 2.1:

- 2.16 The resulting United Kingdom electoral quota is 73,393 electors. This is the total mainland electorate of 47,338,266 divided by the 645 mainland constituencies.
- 2.17 To be no less than 95% and no more than 105% of the United Kingdom electoral quota, the electorate of a constituency has to be no fewer than 69,724 and no more than 77,062.
- 2.18 These figures define the limits for constituency design throughout this review, and are therefore essential data for the review.
- 2.19 The electorate data comprised counts of electors for each electoral ward and council area and is published on our website.
- 2.20 We ensure all constituencies are within the electoral quota.
- 2.21 We have published on our website information on our method for calculating electorates in proposed constituencies where we divided an electoral ward between constituencies. We have had to divide some wards because multi-member wards in Scotland have relatively large electorates.

Allocation of constituencies

- 2.22 The legislation specifies the method for the allocation of constituencies to each of the four constituent parts of the United Kingdom.
- 2.23 The number of constituencies allocated to Scotland is in addition to the two island constituencies, the number of constituencies allocated to England is in addition to the two Isle of Wight constituencies and in addition to Ynys Môn (Anglesey) in Wales. In addition to these island constituencies, each of Scotland, England, Northern Ireland and Wales is allocated a number of the remaining 645 constituencies in proportion to their electorate. Scotland's allocation of constituencies for this review is 55. When added to the two Scottish island constituencies, this makes a total of 57 constituencies in Scotland.
- 2.24 The allocation of constituencies for this review is shown in Table 2.2:

Areas of constituencies

- 2.25 The legislation requires constituencies not to exceed an area of 13,000 square kilometres. It exempts constituencies from the minimum electorate requirement if they exceed 12,000 square kilometres and it is not reasonably possible to meet the minimum electorate requirement. It is only in Highland Council area that this exemption could apply.
- 2.26 We use geographical information system software, in conjunction with map data from Ordnance Survey. This allows us to calculate the area of any proposed constituency with a high degree of precision.
- 2.27 In our area calculations, we use the "Extent of the Realm". This includes foreshore (the area between high water and low water), inland areas of water, and any statutory seaward extensions of council areas. These statutory seaward extensions occur around ports and harbours: the largest for a mainland council area in Scotland is in Aberdeen City and is less than 20 square kilometres. Apart from these statutory seaward extensions, we do not include areas of sea in our calculations of constituency areas.

Liaison with political parties

2.28 In June 2021, we met with those political parties with Members of Parliament representing Scottish constituencies to explain our intended approach to the review, and to discuss their participation in the review process.

Publication of meeting papers

- 2.29 We published all of our meeting papers and minutes on a staged basis during the review.
- 2.30 We published the minutes and meeting papers relating to the development of our Initial Proposals when we commenced the consultation on our Initial Proposals. We published the minutes and meeting papers relating to the development of our Revised Proposals when we commenced the consultation on our Revised Proposals. We will publish the more recent papers for this review once this report is published for the general public.
- 2.31 We believe that publishing this information:
 - demonstrates that the Commission is operating in an open and transparent manner;
 - · identifies options which the Commission has considered; and
 - improves understanding of the Commission's reasons for choosing one option over another.

Representations

- 2.32 When we published proposals for public consultation, we received representations from a range of interests, including political parties, local authorities, elected representatives, community groups and members of the public.
- 2.33 We found representations which opposed our proposals particularly valuable if they included an alternative suggestion which took into account local ties, the legislative requirements for the review and our need to take a consistent approach throughout Scotland.
- 2.34 We accepted representations in writing, including email and the reply facility provided on our website. The Public Hearings provided an opportunity to make a representation orally. We did not accept representations via social media and asked those who contacted us in that way to submit their views formally via our consultation site, by email or by post.
- 2.35 We could not consider representations about issues that are not within our remit or the legislative framework for this review. These included representations which opposed a reduction in the number of MPs in Scotland and those which sought to retain existing constituencies, or design new constituencies, outwith the electoral quota.
- 2.36 Prior to our meetings, our Secretariat summarised the representations received and the issues that they raised and these summaries were included in the papers for our consideration. In addition, we had access to full copies of all of the representations. This approach allowed us to consider thoroughly all of the issues raised.
- 2.37 We published all of the representations received on our consultation website www.bcs2023review.com.

3 Our approach

Principles for constituency design

- 3.1 The legislation sets the specific requirements for constituency design in this review, www.legislation.gov.uk/ukpga/1986/56/contents. Within those requirements, we have discretion on how to design constituencies.
- 3.2 We have taken account of existing boundaries when designing new constituencies. However, because of the legislation governing this review, such as the requirement for electorates to be within 5% variance from the electoral quota, it has often not been possible for our proposed constituencies to fit with other boundaries.
- 3.3 In general, we aimed to design as many constituencies as practicable that do not cross a council area boundary and to take into consideration local geography (for example; transport links, other electoral boundaries, administrative boundaries and natural features).

Grouping of council areas

- 3.4 We aimed to minimise the number of constituencies that combined parts of more than one council area. Firstly, we believe the electorate understand and accept the value of council areas as part of the administrative landscape. Secondly, we recognise that elections are organised by local government officials, and that having constituencies that are wholly contained in a single council area simplifies that task. Thirdly, we are aware that political parties take account of council area boundaries when organising themselves locally.
- 3.5 We calculated the theoretical entitlement to constituencies for each council area by dividing the council area electorate by the United Kingdom electoral quota. Details of the electorate of each council area, and the corresponding entitlement to constituencies, are given in Appendix B.
- 3.6 We examined a number of ways of combining the 29 mainland council areas into groups so that a whole number of constituencies could be designed covering each group. This assisted us in minimising the number of constituencies comprising parts of more than one council area.
- 3.7 We noted that our approach to constituency design in Highland Council area could impact on constituency design elsewhere in Scotland, since it is possible to design one or two constituencies there with an area of more than 12,000 square kilometres and an electorate of less than the otherwise required minimum for this review.
- 3.8 Designing such constituencies in Highland Council area would use the exception to the minimum electorate rule. It would result in the number of constituencies available to cover the rest of Scotland being reduced. This would lead to the other constituencies in Scotland having, on average, a larger electorate and limit our ability to accommodate the other factors for constituency design allowed for in the legislation.
- 3.9 We can recommend a constituency of more than 12,000 square kilometres with an electorate that is below the minimum only if we are "satisfied that it is not reasonably possible for the constituency to comply" with the usual minimum electorate requirement.

- 3.10 When we examined possible constituency designs for Highland Council area, we concluded that it was reasonably possible to design constituencies covering that council area whose electorate complied with the minimum electorate limit specified in the legislation.
- 3.11 Having reached that conclusion, we decided on our preferred approach to grouping council areas for the purpose of constituency design. We noted that our intended groupings of council areas could only be confirmed once we examined detailed constituency designs and had concluded that these constituency designs were acceptable.
- 3.12 Our approach to grouping council areas for constituency design is shown in Map 3.1. In each group the entitlement, when rounded to the nearest whole number, gives the number of constituencies which can be designed in such a way that each constituency is within the electoral quota.
- 3.13 Details of our deliberations for each grouping are in Appendix A.

Design factors

- 3.14 As indicated in 2.12, the legislation lists a series of factors which we may take into account when designing constituencies, if and to such an extent as we think fit. They are: special geographical considerations; local government boundaries; existing constituency boundaries; and local ties.
- 3.15 These factors are subordinate to the requirements on electorate and area.

Special geographical considerations

- 3.16 Wherever possible and relevant, we took into account special geographical considerations. This factor informed our thinking in respect of constituency design throughout Scotland.
- 3.17 The areas where special geographical considerations are most likely to arise are the sparsely populated areas of the islands, and north and west Scotland. The numerical limits on electorate and constituency area which apply in this review limited our ability to adjust constituency design to reflect these special geographical circumstances.

Local government boundaries

- 3.18 The legislation allows us to take account of local government boundaries as they existed on the "most recent ordinary council-election day" before the review date, which was 4 May 2017.
- 3.19 We did take account of ward boundaries when proposing constituencies, as well as other current and historic electoral boundaries, administrative boundaries and natural features.
- 3.20 Multi-member wards with large electorates combined with the requirement that the electorate of each constituency is within 5% of the United Kingdom electoral quota, made it impracticable in this review to create constituencies which reflect local ties and special geographical considerations simply by aggregating electoral wards.
- 3.21 Where we divided an electoral ward between constituencies, we needed to calculate the electorate of the electoral ward in each constituency. We developed

- a methodology for doing this using postcodes and individual addresses which is available on our website.
- 3.22 We took account of the ward boundaries in place at 4 May 2017, in line with the legislation. New wards were introduced from May 2022 for Na h-Eileanan an Iar, North Ayrshire, Orkney Islands and Shetland Islands Council areas and we explored using these during the development of our Revised Proposals if consultation responses suggested adopting them to improve local ties. However, we did so on the merits of their being better indicators of local ties, rather than because they are the new ward boundaries.
- 3.23 In this review, we aimed to make proposals for constituencies which were wholly within a single council area. Where that was not practicable, we aimed to propose constituencies which were wholly within two or (if necessary) three neighbouring council areas.
- 3.24 In some cases, a desire to fit within council area boundaries and a desire to fit within electoral wards conflict. For example, there were cases where it was only possible to design a constituency made up of whole electoral wards by including wards from more than one council area.

Existing constituencies

- 3.25 The existing 59 UK Parliament constituencies in Scotland came into force in 2005, resulting from our Fifth Periodical Review of Parliamentary Constituencies. There have been no alterations to the constituencies since then.
- 3.26 The existing constituencies were used in the General Elections of 2005, 2010, 2015, 2017 and 2019.
- 3.27 They include Orkney and Shetland, which was a constituency specified in the legislation governing the Fifth Review, and Na h-Eileanan an Iar, which we had recommended as a constituency, despite its low electorate, because of its geographical circumstances.
- 3.28 The 2 March 2020 electorates of the existing constituencies, apart from the island constituencies, varied from 46,924 to 88,506. Eighteen of the existing mainland constituencies were within 5% of the electoral quota for this review.
- 3.29 Even where an existing constituency had an electorate that was within the permitted range, it was not always possible to retain it, because of changes required to surrounding constituencies.
- 3.30 Maps of the existing UK Parliament constituencies in Scotland appear at Appendix C.
- 3.31 There are 73 Scottish Parliament constituencies. As there are to be 57 UK Parliament constituencies in Scotland, it is not in general possible for their boundaries to coincide. However, the boundaries of existing Scottish Parliament constituencies are a factor which we took into account.

Local ties

3.32 Local ties exist between many different areas, settlements and communities in Scotland. Our approaches of minimising the number of constituencies which cross council area boundaries and trying to use complete wards when designing constituencies are intended to help us reflect local ties.

3.33 When we have divided an electoral ward between constituencies, we have done so using community council boundaries or clear geographic features such as major roads, railway lines and waterways in a way that we believe reflects local ties as far as possible.


Naming and designation of constituencies

- 3.34 We used the following broad guidelines when proposing names for constituencies:
 - to use an existing constituency name where there is a successor constituency that is recognisably similar;
 - to prefer constituency names that are short rather than attempt to describe an area exhaustively;
 - to ensure that names of UK Parliament constituencies in general differ from those of Scottish Parliament constituencies where an appropriate and distinct alternative is available. Relying on word order alone (e.g. "Glasgow East" and "East Glasgow") or conjunctions (e.g. "North and East Fife" and "North East Fife") is generally not a sufficient difference;
 - not to place compass points at the beginning of a name in order to help make an alphabetically sorted list easier to use. We make an exception if a constituency is named after a council area or town which has a compass point at the start of its name (such as East Lothian); and
 - to typically avoid the same name for a constituency and a council area unless the two are coterminous.
- 3.35 We took account of local views when recommending names for constituencies.
- 3.36 We are required to designate each constituency as either a burgh or a county constituency, but the legislation does not define these terms. The designation affects allowable candidate expenditure at elections. We have designated constituencies comprising predominantly urban areas as burgh constituencies and constituencies which are predominantly rural as county constituencies. For this review, the largest burgh constituency covered 107 square kilometres and the smallest county constituency covered 142 square kilometres.

Postcodes

- 3.37 We make extensive use of postcodes during our reviews as a means of counting electors within proposed constituencies. This is possible because the electoral registers include postcodes for electors, and because of the availability of a boundary dataset depicting the extent of each postcode.
- 3.38 However, postcode boundaries are not suitable as building blocks for constituencies. They are designed by Royal Mail for the purpose of delivering mail. As a result, they often do not follow the type of physical, natural or administrative features which make good constituency boundaries.

4 Review stages

Initial Proposals

- 4.1 We developed our Initial Proposals at our meetings between April and August 2021. Details of our Initial Proposals can be found in the appropriate sections of Appendix A, and in the minutes and papers of our meetings which are available on our website.
- 4.2 We followed the established practice of publishing Initial Proposals for public consultation without first consulting with other interested bodies.

Initial consultation

- 4.3 We published our Initial Proposals on 14 October 2021. The required statutory consultation period of eight weeks lasted until 8 December 2021.
- 4.4 At all stages of our consultation, we put great importance on widely publicising our proposals in order to give as many people and organisations as possible the opportunity to comment on them. We wrote to all key stakeholders, held a press conference and displayed our proposals within at least one display point in each proposed constituency.
- 4.5 We made extensive use of maps in our published material, since we believe they provide the best means of explaining our proposals.
- 4.6 We were keen to hear opinions in support of and in opposition to our proposals and outlined this in our consultation documents.
- 4.7 We published our proposals on our website and consultation website which allowed users to view our proposals on an interactive map and to submit comments to us.

Secondary consultation

- 4.8 On 10 February 2022, we published on our website the representations received during our initial consultation and invited written comment on them during the statutory secondary consultation period of six weeks.
- 4.9 Before publishing representations, we removed personal contact information, such as addresses, phone numbers and email addresses, in line with our privacy policy.
- 4.10 The secondary consultation helped us to evaluate representations and the evidence which they contained. It allowed us to get a sense of widespread concerns and of areas where there were contradictory views.

Public Hearings

4.11 During February and March 2022, as part of the secondary consultation on our Initial Proposals, we held five Public Hearings around Scotland (in Edinburgh, Glasgow, Inverness, Oban and Perth), which was the maximum number allowed. We published transcripts of all Public Hearings on our website. More information about the Public Hearings is in Appendix D.

Representations

4.12 We received 1,106 representations during the initial consultation period. We received 184 further representations during the secondary consultation and at the Public Hearings. Further detail of our consideration of representations can be found in the appropriate sections of Appendix A.

Revised Proposals

- 4.13 We considered all representations and the transcripts of the Public Hearings. Having done so, we developed our Revised Proposals at our meetings between May and July 2022. Details of our Revised Proposals can be found in the appropriate sections of Appendix A, and in the minutes and papers of our meetings which are available on our website.
- 4.14 From our Initial Proposals we made changes to 35 constituency boundaries, three constituency names and 20 constituency names and boundaries.
- 4.15 We published our Revised Proposals on 8 November 2022 and the statutory consultation period of four weeks lasted until 5 December 2022. The legislation does not allow for Public Hearings in connection with our Revised Proposals.
- 4.16 Our consultation on our Revised Proposals was guided by the same factors as our initial consultation, as set out in paragraphs 4.4 to 4.7.
- 4.17 We received 864 representations on our Revised Proposals. Further detail of our consideration of representations can be found in the appropriate sections of Appendix A.

Final Recommendations

- 4.18 We considered all representations received regarding our Revised Proposals and decided whether any further modifications were required. Having done so, we developed our Final Recommendations at our meetings of 14 February and 20 March 2023. Details of our discussions are recorded in the minutes and papers of our meetings which are available on our website.
- 4.19 From our Revised Proposals we made changes to 27 constituency boundaries, six constituency names and 13 constituency names and boundaries.

Public Engagement

- 4.20 When we published our Initial and Revised Proposals, the legislation required us to take such steps as we thought fit to inform people in each proposed constituency:
 - what our proposals were;
 - that a copy of the proposals was open to inspection at a specified place in the constituency; and
 - that written representations could be made to us.
- 4.21 To meet these requirements, we distributed information to display points in order to make our proposals readily accessible during the public consultation stages. We advertised the review in local and national newspapers. We tried to raise awareness of the review via social media. We paid to advertise on Facebook

- and Twitter, used our own Twitter and Facebook pages and when writing to Councils asked them to publicise the consultation on their social media channels.
- 4.22 In addition to the statutory requirements, we disseminated proposals in various ways. Details of proposals were sent directly to a range of recipients, including MPs, MSPs, the Scottish headquarters of political parties with MPs representing Scottish constituencies, the House of Commons Library and the Scottish Parliament Information Centre. In addition, we notified Local Authorities, Electoral Registration Officers, the Independent Parliamentary Standards Authority and more than 1,100 Community Councils. We also issued news releases on each occasion when we undertook public consultation, and made all of the consultation documents available on our website.
- 4.23 We jointly commissioned a web-based consultation site with the Boundary Commission for England and Boundary Commission for Wales. The site allowed users to view our proposals on an interactive map, to submit their comments to us directly through the consultation site, and to view comments made during earlier consultation periods.

5 Final Recommendations and analysis

Recommended constituencies

- 5.1 We recommend the 55 UK Parliament constituencies covering mainland Scotland as shown in Table 5.1. The areas covered by these constituencies are listed in Appendix F and shown on the maps in Appendix G of this report and on our website.
- 5.2 The constituencies covering the island council areas are also included in Table 5.1 for completeness, although their extents are defined in the legislation.
- 5.3 Table 5.1 lists each constituency with its parliamentary electorate on 2 March 2020. The United Kingdom electoral quota is 73,393, as described in Section 2.
- 5.4 Details of our deliberations in arriving at our recommendations for each constituency are given in the appropriate sections of Appendix A.
- 5.5 A list of the recommended constituencies covering each council area is in Appendix E.
- 5.6 Details of the wards and part-wards making up each constituency are in Appendix F.

Analysis

- 5.7 The March 2020 electorates of all of our recommended 55 mainland constituencies comply with the legislation. They are all within 5% of the United Kingdom electoral quota and vary from 69,734 to 77,008 electors.
- 5.8 Our recommendations include eight mainland constituencies which are unchanged from existing constituencies: Ayr, Carrick and Cumnock; Berwickshire, Roxburgh and Selkirk; Central Ayrshire; East Renfrewshire; Kilmarnock and Loudoun; Midlothian; North Ayrshire and Arran; and West Aberdeenshire and Kincardine. Na h-Eileanan an lar constituency and Orkney and Shetland constituency are defined in the legislation for this review and are unchanged from existing constituencies.
- 5.9 Our recommendations include three mainland council areas where the electorates permit a whole number of constituencies exactly covering the extent of the council area: Aberdeen City where there are two constituencies recommended; East Renfrewshire which is recommended to comprise one constituency; and Midlothian which is recommended to comprise one constituency.
- 5.10 Our recommendations include: 272 mainland wards contained within a single constituency; 58 mainland wards divided between two constituencies; one mainland ward divided between three constituencies; and one mainland ward divided between four constituencies.
- 5.11 Of the recommended mainland constituencies, 37 are contained within a single council area, 17 each include parts of two council areas and one, Dumfriesshire, Clydesdale and Tweeddale, includes parts of three council areas.
- 5.12 Of the mainland constituencies existing at the start of this review, 48 were contained within a single council area, eight included parts of two council areas, while one included parts of three council areas. The constraints of the revised legislation result in more constituencies in our recommendations having to cross council boundaries.
- 5.13 Our recommendations include 17 burgh constituencies and 40 county constituencies.

Acknowledgements

- 5.14 We are grateful for the extensive support which we have received from local authorities in conducting the review, including providing facilities to allow us to make our proposals available for public consultation.
- 5.15 We are also grateful to those individuals and organisations who have responded to our public consultations, and thereby enabled us to consider a wide range of views when arriving at our Final Recommendations.
- 5.16 We would like to record our gratitude to Mr Dominic Cuthbert who represented the Director General of Ordnance Survey as our Assessor.
- 5.17 We gratefully acknowledge the important role played by the Sheriffs Principal who conducted Public Hearings on our behalf.
- 5.18 We would also like to thank our Secretariat for their excellent work and the support they provided during the conduct of our review.

Next review

5.19 This concludes our report on our 2023 Review of UK Parliament constituencies in accordance with the Parliamentary Constituencies Act 1986, as amended. Our next review must be submitted before 1 July 2031.



Initial Proposals

- 2. We designed constituencies for this area within our overall approach to grouping council areas for constituency design. Our proposed grouping for this area included two constituencies exactly covering the extent of Aberdeen City Council area.
- 3. We discussed our Initial Proposals for this council area in Paper 2021/12 and Paper 2021/14. Our discussion and conclusions are recorded in the minutes of our meetings of 17 May 2021 and 19 July 2021. We agreed proposed constituency names and designations after considering Paper 2021/24. Our discussion and conclusions are recorded in the minutes of our meeting of 24 August 2021.
- 4. In deciding upon our Initial Proposals for Aberdeen City Council area we agreed a constituency design that aimed to retain traditional north-south constituencies within the council area. The proposed boundary between the Aberdeen North and Aberdeen South constituencies followed ward boundaries, except by Rosemount.
- 5. Our Initial Proposals were as shown in Table A1.2. Details of the wards contained within each constituency in the Initial Proposals were included in the maps of our Initial Proposals which are available on our website.

- 6. On 14 October 2021, we published our Initial Proposals for this council area for the specified initial consultation period of eight weeks.
- 7. We received five representations in response to the initial consultation on our Initial Proposals for Aberdeen City Council area.

8. On 10 February 2022, we published the representations we received during the consultation for the specified secondary consultation period of six weeks. In response, we received a further two representations concerning Aberdeen City Council area.

Revised Proposals

- 9. We considered the representations received on our Initial Proposals in this council area in Paper 2022/08. Our discussion and conclusions are recorded in the minutes of our meeting of 9 May 2022.
- 10. There was little support or opposition for the Initial Proposals and no alternative suggestions were submitted.
- 11. Some representations contained suggestions that did not comply with the statutory rules governing this review. These mainly opposed a reduction in the number of MPs in Scotland. We did not consider those suggestions further.
- 12. In response to all of the comments and suggestions to the consultation we decided to retain the two Aberdeen constituencies from our Initial Proposals as our Revised Proposals.
- 13. We agreed revised constituency names and designations after considering Paper 2022/20. Our discussion and conclusions are recorded in the minutes of our meeting of 18 July 2022.
- 14. Our Revised Proposals are shown in Table A1.3. Details of the wards contained within each constituency in the Revised Proposals were included in the maps of our Revised Proposals which are available on our website.

- 15. On 8 November 2022, we published our Revised Proposals for constituencies in Aberdeen City Council area for the specified consultation period of four weeks.
- 16. We received two representations in response to the consultation on our Revised Proposals for Aberdeen City Council area. One response supported the Revised Proposals because they placed two constituencies within the Aberdeen City Council area boundary. The other response raised concerns with the proposed boundary by Kittybrewster but offered no alternative boundary suggestion.
- 17. Some general representations contained suggestions that did not comply with the statutory rules governing this review. These mainly opposed a reduction in the number of MPs in Scotland. We did not consider those suggestions further.

Final Recommendations

18. We considered the representations received in response to our public consultation on our Revised Proposals at our meeting of 14 February 2023. Paper 2023/02 and the minutes of our meeting record our discussion and conclusions.

- 19. In light of the lack of opposition or any alternative suggestions within statutory rules we agreed that no change was required to this aspect of our Revised Proposals and adopted it within our Final Recommendations.
- 20. We agreed recommended constituency names and designations at our meeting of 20 March 2023. Paper 2023/14 and the minutes of our meeting record our discussion and conclusions. We decided to make no changes to the constituency names.
- 21. Details of our Final Recommendations for constituencies in Aberdeen City Council area are in Table A1.4. 

At the start of this review, Argyll and Bute had one constituency wholly within its council area; Aberdeenshire had two constituencies wholly within its council area and one constituency partly in the council area and partly in Aberdeen City Council area; Highland had three constituencies wholly within its council area; and Moray had one constituency wholly within its council area. Initial Proposals

- 23. We designed constituencies for this area within our overall approach to grouping council areas for constituency design. Our proposed grouping for this area included: one constituency within Aberdeenshire Council area; one constituency within Argyll and Bute Council area and partly within Highland Council area; two constituencies within Highland Council area; one constituency partly within Highland Council area and partly within Moray Council area; and two constituencies partly within Moray Council area and partly within Aberdeenshire Council area.
- 24. We discussed our Initial Proposals for these council areas in Papers 2021/08, 2021/12 and 2021/14. Our discussion and conclusions are recorded in the minutes of our meeting of 12 April 2021, 17 May 2021 and 19 July 2021. We agreed proposed constituency names and designations after considering Paper 2021/24. Our discussion and conclusions are recorded in the minutes of our meeting of 24 August 2021.
- 25. In deciding upon our Initial Proposals for Aberdeenshire, Argyll and Bute, Highland and Moray Council areas we proposed seven constituencies within this grouping. There are currently eight constituencies. The existing West Aberdeenshire and Kincardine constituency was unchanged. The proposed Argyll constituency contained the whole of Argyll and Bute Council area as well as Ardnamurchan, Glen Coe and Loch Leven. The proposed Highland Central constituency included Inverness, Fort William and Skye. The proposed Highland North constituency contained the northern half of Highland Council area. The proposed Highland East and Elgin constituency

- included Badenoch and Strathspey, Nairn and Elgin. The proposed Banff and Buchan constituency followed the north coast of Aberdeenshire and included Buckie, Fraserburgh, Keith and Peterhead. The proposed Gordon and Moray South contained Ellon, Huntly and Dufftown.
- 26. Our Initial Proposals were as shown in Table A2.2. Details of the wards contained within each constituency in the Initial Proposals were included in the maps of our Initial Proposals which are available on our website.

- 27. On 14 October 2021, we published our Initial Proposals for these council areas for the specified initial consultation period of eight weeks.
- 28. We received 224 representations in response to the initial consultation on our Initial Proposals for Aberdeenshire, Argyll and Bute, Highland and Moray Council areas.
- 29. On 10 February 2022, we published the representations we received during the consultation for the specified secondary consultation period of six weeks. In response, we received a further 41 representations concerning Aberdeenshire, Argyll and Bute, Highland and Moray Council areas.

Revised Proposals

- 30. We considered the representations received on our Initial Proposals in these council areas in Paper 2022/12, Paper 2022/15 and Paper 2022/19. Our discussion and conclusions are recorded in the minutes of our meetings of 9 May 2022, 6 June 2022 and 18 July 2022.
- 31. The comments and suggestions received during the initial consultation included: opposition to Moray being split between three constituencies, when the existing Moray constituency is within the electorate quota for the 2023 Review; opposition to the size of the proposed Highland North constituency; suggestions to name a constituency Argyll and Bute; and opposition to the proposed boundary in Lochaber.
- 32. Some representations contained suggestions that did not comply with the statutory rules governing this review. These mainly opposed a reduction in the number of MPs in Scotland. We did not consider those suggestions further.

- 33. In response to all of the comments and suggestions to the consultation we decided to amend the proposed boundaries: in Wester Ross to create a smaller northern constituency; to the east of Inverness to follow a ward boundary; north of Kinlochleven to follow a community council area boundary; and Moray was divided between two rather than three constituencies (we were unable to find a way to avoid dividing Moray because of the electorate numbers in surrounding areas). We retained the existing West Aberdeenshire and Kincardine constituency from our Initial Proposals.
- 34. We agreed revised constituency names and designations after considering Paper 2022/20. Our discussion and conclusions are recorded in the minutes of our meeting of 18 July 2022. West Aberdeenshire and Kincardine was the only constituency name we retained from our Initial Proposals.
- 35. Our Revised Proposals are shown in Table A2.3. Details of the wards contained within each constituency in the Revised Proposals were included in the maps of our Revised Proposals which are available on our website.

- 36. On 8 November 2022, we published our Revised Proposals for constituencies in Aberdeenshire, Argyll and Bute, Highland and Moray Council areas for the specified consultation period of four weeks.
- 37. We received 326 representations in response to the consultation on our Revised Proposals for Aberdeenshire, Argyll and Bute, Highland and Moray Council areas. Most of the responses focused on Highland and Moray Council areas. In Moray there was a desire to retain the existing Moray constituency because it was within the electorate quota and in Highland there was opposition to the breaking of local ties between Inverness and Culloden.
- 38. Some general representations contained suggestions that did not comply with the statutory rules governing this review. These mainly opposed a reduction in the number of MPs in Scotland. We did not consider those suggestions further.

 We considered the representations received in response to our public consultation on our Revised Proposals at our meetings of 14 February 2023 and 20 March 2023.


- Paper 2023/06 and Paper 2023/11 and the minutes of our meetings record our discussion and conclusions.
- 40. We noted there had been opposition to our Revised Proposals in Aberdeenshire, Highland and Moray and as a consequence made changes in these areas by: placing Balloch, Culloden and Smithton in a constituency with Inverness; to consider new housing developments to the east and south of Elgin; and better to reflect local ties in Aberdeenshire by Strichen. As a result of these changes we had proposed following the boundary of the Highland North constituency from our Initial Proposals but as there was opposition to the size of that constituency we revised the boundary in Wester Ross.
- 41. We agreed recommended constituency names and designations at our meeting of 20 March 2023. Paper 2023/14 and the minutes of our meeting record our discussion and conclusions. We decided to revise the names of three constituencies and named them: Gordon and Buchan; Inverness, Skye and West Ross-shire; and Moray West, Nairn and Strathspey.
- 42. Details of our Final Recommendations for constituencies in Aberdeenshire; Argyll and Bute; Highland; and Moray Council areas are in Table A2.4. Falkirk Council area contained one constituency wholly within Falkirk Council area and one partly in Falkirk Council area and partly within West Lothian Council area. West Lothian Council area contained one constituency wholly within it. Three of the constituencies were within the electoral quota. The constituencies are shown in Table A3.1.

Initial Proposals

44. We designed constituencies for this area within our overall approach to grouping council areas for constituency design. Our proposed grouping for this area included: one constituency partly in Angus and Dundee City Council areas; one constituency partly in Angus and Perth and Kinross Council areas; one constituency partly in Dundee City and Perth and Kinross Council areas; one constituency wholly within Falkirk Council area; two constituencies partly in Fife and Perth and Kinross Council areas; two constituencies wholly within Fife Council area; one constituency partly in Falkirk and West Lothian Council areas; one constituency wholly within West Lothian Council area; one constituency that included Clackmannanshire Council area and part of Falkirk Council area; one constituency wholly within Perth and Kinross Council area; and one constituency wholly within Stirling Council area.

- 45. We discussed our Initial Proposals for these council areas in Paper 2021/17 and Paper 2021/23. Our discussion and conclusions are recorded in the minutes of our meetings of 19 July 2021 and 24 August 2021. We agreed proposed constituency names and designations after considering Paper 2021/24. Our discussion and conclusions are recorded in the minutes of our meeting of 24 August 2021.
- In deciding upon our Initial Proposals for Angus, Clackmannanshire, Dundee City, Falkirk, Fife, Perth and Kinross, Stirling, and West Lothian Council areas we agreed a constituency design that retained the overall number of constituencies at 13. The existing Stirling constituency was the only unchanged constituency. The proposed Angus and Strathmore constituency included the Angus Glens, Forfar, Montrose and Blairgowrie. We retained an east-west split in Dundee where the proposed boundaries followed ward boundaries. The proposed Dundee East and Arbroath constituency included the coastal towns of Arbroath, Broughty Ferry and Carnoustie. The proposed Dundee West and Gowrie constituency split the Perth and Kinross Carse of Gowrie ward by following higher ground above the A90 road. The proposed Livingston constituency contained Livingston and Whitburn. The proposed Linlithgow and Bathgate constituency also included Bo'ness. The proposed Forth Valley South constituency contained Falkirk, Grangemouth and Bonnybridge. The proposed Mid Forth Valley constituency contained Clackmannanshire, Denny and Stenhousemuir. The proposed West Fife constituency was similar to the existing Dunfermline and West Fife constituency but the boundary followed the M90 and included the Crook of Devon. The proposed Kirkcaldy and Cowdenbeath constituency followed ward boundaries within Fife Council area. The proposed North East Fife constituency was similar to the existing constituency except for minor changes to the boundary by Leven. The proposed Glenrothes and Loch Leven constituency followed ward boundaries and included Kinross. The proposed Perth and Tay constituency followed ward boundaries within Perth and Kinross council area and included Perth, Aberfeldy, Crieff and Auchterarder.
- 47. Our Initial Proposals were as shown in Table A3.2. Details of the wards contained within each constituency in the Initial Proposals were included in the maps of our Initial Proposals which are available on our website.

- 48. On 14 October 2021, we published our Initial Proposals for these council areas for the specified initial consultation period of eight weeks.
- 49. We received 468 representations in response to the initial consultation on our Initial Proposals for Angus, Clackmannanshire, Dundee City, Falkirk, Fife, Perth and Kinross, Stirling, and West Lothian Council areas.
- 50. On 10 February 2022, we published the representations we received during the consultation for the specified secondary consultation period of six weeks. In response, we received a further 58 representations concerning Angus, Clackmannanshire, Dundee City, Falkirk, Fife, Perth and Kinross, Stirling, and West Lothian Council areas.

- 51. We considered the representations received on our Initial Proposals in these council area groupings in Paper 2022/11 and Paper 2022/19. Our discussion and conclusions are recorded in the minutes of our meeting of 9 May 2022 and 18 July 2022.
- 52. The comments and suggestions received during the initial consultation included strong opposition to: dividing Kinross-shire between constituencies and placing part of it in a Fife constituency; placing Carse of Gowrie in a Dundee constituency rather than a Perth constituency; and a constituency overlapping the River Forth. However, there was some support for the proposed Perth and Tay constituency.

- 53. Some representations contained suggestions that did not comply with the statutory rules governing this review. These mainly opposed a reduction in the number of MPs in Scotland. We did not consider those suggestions further.
- 54. In response to all of the comments and suggestions to the consultation we decided to make a number of changes from our Initial Proposals. In West Lothian Council area we agreed to adopt a suggestion that placed Broxburn and Uphall in a Livingston constituency and Whitburn and Blackburn in a Bathgate and Linlithgow constituency as it would better reflect historical local ties. In Falkirk Council area: Skinflats was added to a Falkirk constituency; and Denny and Stenhousemuir, added with most of Clackmannanshire and Auchterarder to create a Clackmannanshire and Forth Valley constituency. In Fife Council area: Dollar was included in a Dunfermline and East Ochils constituency; the Kirkcaldy and Cowdenbeath constituency boundary was amended at Kelty and West Wemyss; and the Glenrothes constituency included Scotlandwell from Kinross-shire. In Perth and Kinross Council area: a Perth and Loch Leven constituency included Kinross-shire, Perth, Strathearn and Carse of Gowrie; and a North Tayside constituency included north Perthshire, Brechin, Forfar and Montrose. In Angus and Dundee City Council areas we proposed a Dundee West constituency and a Dundee East and Arbroath constituency. The proposed Stirling constituency was unchanged from the existing arrangements and Initial Proposals. The proposed North East Fife constituency was unchanged from the Initial Proposals.
- 55. We agreed revised constituency names and designations after considering Paper 2022/20. Our discussion and conclusions are recorded in the minutes of our meeting of 18 July 2022.
- 56. Our Revised Proposals are shown in Table A3.3. Details of the wards contained within each constituency in the Revised Proposals were included in the maps of our Revised Proposals which are available on our website.

- 57. On 8 November 2022, we published our Revised Proposals for constituencies in Angus, Clackmannanshire, Dundee City, Falkirk, Fife, Perth and Kinross, Stirling, and West Lothian Council areas for the specified consultation period of four weeks.
- 58. We received 236 representations in response to the consultation on our Revised Proposals for Angus; Clackmannanshire; Dundee City; Falkirk; Fife; Perth and Kinross; Stirling; and West Lothian Council areas. Most of the responses focused on Strathallan in Perthshire where representations mentioned a lack of local ties with Clackmannanshire and Falkirk Council areas while some stated they had closer links with Stirling. There was also opposition to the Kinross-shire village of Scotlandwell being in a Fife constituency.
- 59. Some general representations contained suggestions that did not comply with the statutory rules governing this review. These mainly opposed a reduction in the number of MPs in Scotland. We did not consider those suggestions further.

- 60. We considered the representations received in response to our public consultation on our Revised Proposals at our meetings of 14 February 2023 and 20 March 2023. Paper 2023/07 and Paper 2023/12 and the minutes of our meetings record our discussion and conclusions.
- 61. We noted there had been opposition to our Revised Proposals in Kinross-shire and Strathallan and as a consequence we agreed to consider local ties in Kinross-shire


- and included Scotlandwell in a Perth and Kinross-shire constituency, with Kingseat joining a Cowdenbeath and Kirkcaldy constituency as a result. As suggested during the consultation we agreed to add Auchterarder and Aberuthven to create a Stirling and Strathallan constituency because there were some historical links between these areas. Further to this we amended the Clackmannanshire and Forth Valley constituency from our Revised Proposals by Grangemouth and Denny to better reflect local ties in a constituency named Alloa and Grangemouth. Elsewhere we agreed to maintain our Revised Proposals as our Final Recommendations. We were unable to agree to some suggestions because of their impact on neighbouring areas.
- 62. We agreed recommended constituency names and designations at our meeting of 20 March 2023. Paper 2023/14 and the minutes of our meeting record our discussion and conclusions. We retained only four constituency names from our Revised Proposals: Bathgate and Linlithgow; Falkirk; Livingston; and North East Fife.
- 63. Details of our Final Recommendations for constituencies in Angus, Clackmannanshire, Dundee City, Falkirk, Fife, Perth and Kinross, Stirling, and West Lothian Council areas are in Table A3.4. Maps of individual constituencies in the Final Recommendations are available in Appendix G. Constituency by council area is in Appendix E and individual wards contained in each constituency in Appendix F. Analysis of the Final Recommendations appears in Chapter 5.

65. We designed constituencies for this area within our overall approach to grouping council areas for constituency design. Our proposed grouping for this area included two constituencies wholly within North Lanarkshire Council area; three constituencies wholly within South Lanarkshire Council area; one constituency wholly within Dumfries and Galloway Council area; one constituency wholly within Scottish Borders Council area; one constituency containing West Dunbartonshire Council area and part of Glasgow City Council area; two constituencies partly within East Dunbartonshire and North Lanarkshire Council areas; one constituency partly in North Lanarkshire and South Lanarkshire Council areas; and one constituency partly in Dumfries and Galloway, Scottish Borders, and South Lanarkshire Council areas.

- 66. We discussed our Initial Proposals for these council areas in Paper 2021/16 and Paper 2021/22. Our discussion and conclusions are recorded in the minutes of our meetings of 19 July 2021 and 24 August 2021. We agreed proposed constituency names and designations after considering Paper 2021/24. Our discussion and conclusions are recorded in the minutes of our meeting of 24 August 2021.
- In deciding upon our Initial Proposals for Dumfries and Galloway, East Dunbartonshire, North Lanarkshire, Scottish Borders, South Lanarkshire and West Dunbartonshire Council areas we agreed a constituency design that retained the overall number of constituencies at 12. The proposed Dumfries and Galloway constituency was similar to the existing constituency except for minor changes to the boundary by Dumfries. The proposed Berwickshire, Roxburgh and Selkirk constituency was similar to the existing constituency except for minor changes to the boundary by Galashiels. The proposed Dumfriesshire, Tweeddale and Clydesdale constituency was similar to the existing constituency except for minor changes to the boundary by Dumfries, Galashiels and Lanark. The boundaries of both the proposed East Kilbride and Strathaven constituency and Rutherglen constituency followed ward boundaries within South Lanarkshire Council area. The proposed Hamilton and Clyde Valley constituency included Hamilton, Larkhall and Lanark. The proposed Motherwell and Clydesdale North constituency included Motherwell, Wishaw, Carluke and Forth. The proposed Airdrie and Shotts constituency was similar to the existing constituency except for changes to the boundary by Carfin, Cleland and Newmains. The proposed Coatbridge and Bellshill constituency was similar to the existing Coatbridge, Chryston and Bellshill constituency but it no longer included Chryston. The proposed Kelvin South constituency included Cumbernauld, Kirkintilloch and Stepps. The proposed Kelvin North constituency included Bearsden, Bishopbriggs and Kilsyth. The proposed West Dunbartonshire constituency included the whole of the council area and a small area of Yoker in Glasgow.

- 69. On 14 October 2021, we published our Initial Proposals for these council areas for the specified initial consultation period of eight weeks.
- 70. We received 99 representations in response to the initial consultation on our Initial Proposals for Dumfries and Galloway, East Dunbartonshire, North Lanarkshire, Scottish Borders, South Lanarkshire and West Dunbartonshire Council areas.
- 71. On 10 February 2022, we published the representations we received during the consultation for the specified secondary consultation period of six weeks. In response, we received a further 29 representations concerning Dumfries and Galloway, East Dunbartonshire, North Lanarkshire, Scottish Borders, South Lanarkshire and West Dunbartonshire Council areas.

- 72. We considered the representations received on our Initial Proposals in these council areas in Paper 2022/16 and Paper 2022/19. Our discussion and conclusions are recorded in the minutes of our meetings of 6 June 2022 and 18 July 2022.
- 73. The comments and suggestions received during the initial consultation included: Tweed Valley electors stating they have little in common with Clydesdale and Dumfriesshire; opposition to the proposed boundaries by Dumfries and Lanark; opposition to the proposed Kelvin North and Kelvin South constituency names; and the proposals break local ties in North and South Lanarkshire Council areas. There was little opposition to the proposals in West Dunbartonshire Council area.

- 74. Some representations contained suggestions that did not comply with the statutory rules governing this review. These mainly opposed a reduction in the number of MPs in Scotland. We did not consider those suggestions further.
- 75. In response to all of the comments and suggestions to the consultation we made changes from our Initial Proposals in East Dunbartonshire where we proposed: a Kilsyth Hills and Cumbernauld constituency that included Cumbernauld, Kilsyth and Kirkintilloch; and a Bearsden and Campsie Fells constituency that included Bearsden, Milngavie, Bishopbriggs, Stepps and Chryston. The proposed Dumfries and Galloway constituency and Dumfriesshire, Tweeddale and Clydesdale constituency were similar to the Initial Proposals except for minor changes to the boundary by Dumfries at Dunscore and Lochar Water. We also made minor changes to the Initial Proposals at Coatdyke by Coatbridge and at Yoker. We renamed the Airdrie and Shotts constituency as Airdrie. All other constituency names and boundaries were unchanged.
- 76. We agreed revised constituency names and designations after considering Paper 2022/20. Our discussion and conclusions are recorded in the minutes of our meeting of 18 July 2022.
- 77. Our Revised Proposals are shown in Table A4.3. Details of the wards contained within each constituency in the Revised Proposals were included in the maps of our Revised Proposals which are available on our website.

78. On 8 November 2022, we published our Revised Proposals for constituencies in Dumfries and Galloway, East Dunbartonshire, North Lanarkshire, Scottish Borders,

- South Lanarkshire and West Dunbartonshire Council areas for the specified consultation period of four weeks.
- 79. We received 80 representations in response to the consultation on the Revised Proposals for Dumfries and Galloway, East Dunbartonshire, North Lanarkshire, Scottish Borders, South Lanarkshire and West Dunbartonshire Council areas. There were comments and suggestions to retain the existing Berwickshire, Roxburgh and Selkirk constituency and to improve local ties in East Dunbartonshire and North Lanarkshire.
- 80. Some general representations contained suggestions that did not comply with the statutory rules governing this review. These mainly opposed a reduction in the number of MPs in Scotland. We did not consider those suggestions further.


- 81. We considered the representations received in response to our public consultation on our Revised Proposals at our meetings of 14 February 2023 and 20 March 2023. Paper 2023/08 and Paper 2023/13 and the minutes of our meetings record our discussion and conclusions.
- 82. We noted there had been suggestions to amend our Revised Proposals in East Dunbartonshire, North Lanarkshire and Scottish Borders and as a consequence we amended our Revised Proposals in the Scottish Borders that had followed a ward boundary and reverted to the existing Berwickshire, Roxburgh and Selkirk constituency boundary. In East Dunbartonshire we agreed to adopt a suggestion that took account of the existing constituency boundary and would maintain local ties within the area. In North Lanarkshire we aimed to maintain local ties by Newmains and to avoid Carfin being split between constituencies.
- 83. We agreed recommended constituency names and designations at our meeting of 20 March 2023. Paper 2023/14 and the minutes of our meeting record our discussion and conclusions. We made changes to four constituency names, they were: Airdrie and Shotts; Cumbernauld and Kirkintilloch; Mid Dunbartonshire; and Motherwell, Wishaw and Carluke.
- 84. Details of our Final Recommendations for constituencies in Dumfries and Galloway, East Dunbartonshire, North Lanarkshire, Scottish Borders, South Lanarkshire and West Dunbartonshire Council areas are in Table A4.4. 85. - 86. We designed constituencies for this area within our overall approach to grouping council areas for constituency design. Our proposed grouping for this area included four constituencies exactly covering the extent of East Ayrshire, North Ayrshire and South Ayrshire Council areas.
- 87. We discussed our Initial Proposals for these council areas in Paper 2021/09. Our discussion and conclusions are recorded in the minutes of our meeting of 12 April 2021. We agreed proposed constituency names and designations after considering Paper 2021/24. Our discussion and conclusions are recorded in the minutes of our meeting of 24 August 2021.
- 88. In deciding upon our Initial Proposals for East Ayrshire, North Ayrshire and South Ayrshire Council areas we agreed a constituency design that retained the existing constituencies because they considered local community ties and all four constituencies were within the electorate quota for the 2023 Review.

- 92. On 10 February 2022, we published the representations we received during the consultation for the specified secondary consultation period of six weeks. In response, we received a further four representations concerning East Ayrshire, North Ayrshire and South Ayrshire Council areas.

- 93. We considered the representations received on our Initial Proposals in these council areas in Paper 2022/09. Our discussion and conclusions are recorded in the minutes of our meeting of 9 May 2022.
- 94. There was little support or opposition to the Initial Proposals.
- 95. Some representations contained suggestions that did not comply with the statutory rules governing this review. These mainly opposed a reduction in the number of MPs in Scotland. We did not consider those suggestions further.
- 96. In response to all of the comments and suggestions to the consultation we decided to retain the existing constituencies and Initial Proposals as our Revised Proposals.

- 99. On 8 November 2022, we published our Revised Proposals for constituencies in East Ayrshire, North Ayrshire and South Ayrshire Council areas for the specified consultation period of four weeks.
- 100. We received five representations in response to the consultation on our Revised Proposals for East Ayrshire, North Ayrshire and South Ayrshire Council areas. We discussed the alternative suggestion for an Ayr, Troon and Prestwick constituency which we had also considered at an earlier meeting but agreed that as a consequence it would create a large constituency extending from Stewarton to Ballantrae.
- 101. Some general representations contained suggestions that did not comply with the statutory rules governing this review. These mainly opposed a reduction in the number of MPs in Scotland. We did not consider those suggestions further.

- 102. We considered the representations received in response to our public consultation on our Revised Proposals at our meeting of 14 February 2023. Paper 2023/03 and the minutes of our meeting record our discussion and conclusions.
- 103. In light of the lack of opposition or any alternative suggestions that we had not already considered, we agreed that no change was required to this aspect of our Revised Proposals and adopted it within our Final Recommendations.
- 104. We agreed recommended constituency names and designations at our meeting of 20 March 2023. Paper 2023/14 and the minutes of our meeting record our discussion and conclusions. We decided to make no changes to the constituency names.



Initial Proposals

- 107. We designed constituencies for this area within our overall approach to grouping council areas for constituency design. Our proposed grouping included: four constituencies within City of Edinburgh Council area; one constituency partly in City of Edinburgh Council area and partly in East Lothian Council area; one constituency within East Lothian Council area; and one constituency wholly within with Midlothian Council area.
- 108. We discussed our Initial Proposals for these council areas in Paper 2021/13. Our discussion and conclusions are recorded in the minutes of our meeting of 17 May 2021. We agreed proposed constituency names and designations after considering Paper 2021/24. Our discussion and conclusions are recorded in the minutes of our meeting of 24 August 2021.
- 109. In deciding upon our Initial Proposals for City of Edinburgh, East Lothian and Midlothian Council areas we agreed to retain the overall number of constituencies at seven. The existing Midlothian constituency was unchanged. In Edinburgh, the existing Edinburgh South West constituency and the existing constituency names were unchanged. - 111. On 14 October 2021, we published our Initial Proposals for these council areas for the specified initial consultation period of eight weeks.
- 112. We received 64 representations in response to the initial consultation on our Initial Proposals for City of Edinburgh, East Lothian and Midlothian Council areas.
- 113. On 10 February 2022, we published the representations we received during the consultation for the specified secondary consultation period of six weeks. In response, we received a further 19 representations concerning City of Edinburgh, East Lothian and Midlothian Council areas.

- 114. We considered the representations received on our Initial Proposals in these council areas in Paper 2022/10 and Paper 2022/14. Our discussion and conclusions are recorded in the minutes of our meetings of 9 May 2022 and 6 June 2022.
- 115. The comments and suggestions received during the initial consultation included: opposition to the proposed boundary in Musselburgh as it split the town between two constituencies; support for the Initial Proposals in Edinburgh and Midlothian; and some minor alternative boundary suggestions in Edinburgh.
- 116. Some representations contained suggestions that did not comply with the statutory rules governing this review. These mainly opposed a reduction in the number of MPs in Scotland. We did not consider those suggestions further.
- 117. In response to all of the comments and suggestions to the consultation we decided to make a number of changes to the Initial Proposals. The proposed Midlothian constituency and Edinburgh South West constituency were unchanged from the existing arrangements and the Initial Proposals. The other Edinburgh constituency names were unchanged from the existing arrangements and Initial Proposals but there were changes to the proposed constituency boundaries from the Initial Proposals at Pilton and Craigleith with minor changes at Bruntsfield and Moredun. - 120. On 8 November 2022, we published our Revised Proposals for constituencies in City of Edinburgh, East Lothian and Midlothian Council areas for the specified consultation period of four weeks.
- 121. We received 63 representations in response to the consultation on our Revised Proposals for City of Edinburgh, East Lothian and Midlothian Council areas. There was some support or lack of opposition to our Revised Proposals in Edinburgh and Midlothian. In East Lothian some opposition remained to adding Musselburgh to an Edinburgh East constituency.
- 122. Some general representations contained suggestions that did not comply with the statutory rules governing this review. These mainly opposed a reduction in the number of MPs in Scotland. We did not consider those suggestions further.

- 123. We considered the representations received in response to our public consultation on our Revised Proposals at our meeting of 14 February 2023. Paper 2023/04 and the minutes of our meeting record our discussion and conclusions.
- 124. We agreed to retain our Revised Proposals as our Final Recommendations, except for a minor change in Greenbank so that the Edinburgh South West constituency followed a ward boundary. We noted any alternative solution for not placing Musselburgh in an Edinburgh East constituency would break local ties in Midlothian or the Scottish Borders where there was some support for the Revised Proposals.





Our proposed grouping for this area included six constituencies within Glasgow City Council area, one constituency partly in Glasgow City Council area and partly in Renfrewshire Council area, one constituency within Renfrewshire Council area and one constituency partly in Invercied Council area and partly in Renfrewshire Council area.
- 150. We discussed our Initial Proposals for these council areas in Paper 2021/15 and Paper 2021/21. - 162. On 8 November 2022, we published our Revised Proposals for constituencies in Glasgow City, Inverclyde and Renfrewshire Council areas for the specified consultation period of four weeks.
- 163. We received 44 representations in response to the consultation on the Revised Proposals for Glasgow City, Inverclyde and Renfrewshire Council areas. There was little opposition to the Revised Proposals in Inverclyde. We received a range of comments on the boundaries in Glasgow and Renfrewshire.
- 164. Some general representations contained suggestions that did not comply with the statutory rules governing this review. These mainly opposed a reduction in the number of MPs in Scotland. We did not consider those suggestions further.

Final Recommendations

165. We considered the representations received in response to our public consultation on our Revised Proposals at our meetings of 14 February 2023 and 20 March 2023. Paper 2023/05 and Paper 2023/10 and the minutes of our meetings record our discussion and conclusions.

- 166. We noted no alternative boundaries were suggested to resolve any of the concerns raised in Cardonald which had placed that area of Glasgow in a Paisley and Renfrewshire North constituency and we noted there were no strong physical features demarcating the boundary between Glasgow City and Renfrewshire Council areas at Cardonald. We adopted suggestions from the consultation and agreed to make minor amendments to our boundaries at Dargavel in Renfrewshire and Port Dundas in Glasgow to take account of ongoing housing developments. We also re-considered our Initial and Revised Proposals in the east of Glasgow but retained our Revised Proposals as our Final Recommendations there because they had considered other electoral boundaries.
- 167. We agreed recommended constituency names and designations at our meeting of 20 March 2023. Paper 2023/14 and the minutes of our meeting record our discussion and conclusions. We decided to make one change to the constituency names: Glasgow South East was renamed Glasgow East.
- 168. Details of our Final Recommendations for constituencies in Glasgow City, Inverclyde and Renfrewshire Council areas are in Table A8.4. Maps of individual constituencies in the Final Recommendations are available in Appendix G. Constituency by council area is in Appendix E and individual wards contained in each constituency in Appendix F. Analysis of the Final Recommendations appears in Chapter 5.






Map B.2 - Theoretical entitlement to constituencies for mainland council areas

Public Hearings

- 170. The Parliamentary Constituencies Act 1986 (as amended) states we must hold between two and five Public Hearings during the secondary consultation period on our Initial Proposals.
- 171. Each Public Hearing had a geographic focus covering a number of council areas. The majority of comments made at a Hearing related to the area of geographic focus, but we made it clear that someone attending any Hearing was able to comment on our Initial Proposals for any part of Scotland.
- 172. Each Hearing was chaired by a Sheriff Principal. We offered three sessions depending on demand: 10am–12pm, 2pm–4pm and 6pm–8pm.
- 173. People were welcome to attend a Hearing, whether wishing to speak or not. They did not need to attend for the whole day, but were free to arrive or leave when they wished. People did not have to let us know in advance if they wanted to speak at a Hearing, but it assisted the planning of the Hearing if we knew who was intending to speak. Those intending to speak could contact us in advance to arrange a specific time during the Hearing to do so.
- 174. At each Public Hearing, our Secretary made a short statement to explain our proposals for the area and how representations could be made.
- 175. Table D.1 lists the Public Hearings.

- 176. In order to provide a consistent approach, we issued a guidance document to the Chair of each Hearing.
- 177. Twelve people spoke at the Hearings; this was a lower than expected number partly due to the inclement weather conditions on some of those dates and that the legislation does not permit attendance by video-conference. Most of the attendees were associated with a political party or a member of parliament. We are grateful to all participants for assisting in the review. We published transcripts of the Hearings at the same time as we commenced the consultation on our Revised Proposals.
